"Troy and I have always worked well together, and I guess I've always kind of been his reality check," Sheila Ward said. "This camp has always been his dream, and I guess I'm his reality check as far as some of the details. It's a great family project. Even Taylor has little jobs to do with Hockey & Sons.

"I get calls all the time from fathers who tell me, 'Once you get hockey in your blood, you can't get rid of it.' They get so excited about this camp, and I get the feeling that we really have something to offer these people."

## Bulls run over Hawks

The Chicago Bulls, off to their worst start in 20 years, ended a seven-game losing streak with a 77-69 road victory over the punchless Hawks, who were without leading scorer Steve Smith.

Mark Bryant scored 18 points, Toni Kukoc and Randy Brown added 11 each and Ron Harper added 10 for the Bulls (2-8), whose only other victory came Feb. 2 against the hapless Los Angeles Clippers.

Wings 107, Kings 96 — At Orlando, Fla.: Rick Anderson scored a season-high 30 points and Penny Hardaway had 23 points and eight assists Monday night as Orlando remained unbeaten at home with victory over Sacramento.
